



PROGRESSING TOWARD SUSTAINABILITY: GLOBAL GOALS & ALOHA+ CHALLENGE

LEARNING GOALS

- To become familiar with the 17 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and examine how the world as a whole is progressing (or not progressing) towards the targets set out in the goals.
- To explore Hawaii's progress in pursuing the SDGs through the framework of the Aloha+ Challenge.

ASSIGNMENT

Estimated Time: ~30 min

- Read parts of: [Overview — SDG Indicators](#) (~15 min)
 - Read through the infographics for all 17 goals
 - Click on an SDG (icons on the left side of the page) and read the 2020 global progress report on that SDG. Do this for at least 3 SDGs.
- Read parts of: [Aloha + Challenge 2020 Benchmark Report](#) (~12 min). Download the Executive Summary
 - Read page 2 for background information on the Aloha+ Challenge
 - Review the graphics on pages 6 and 7, which illustrate how the six Aloha+ Challenge goals correspond with the UN Sustainable Development Goals
 - Read pages 8-15 for 2020 progress updates on each of the six goals. The "At a Glance" graphic provides a nice summary and is especially helpful.

TERMINOLOGY

- **Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs):** Adopted by the United Nations in 2015, the 17 SDGs are targets for creating a more sustainable future for people of all countries by 2030. Though not legally binding, countries are responsible for implementing the goals and collecting data on their progress.
- **Globalization:** The process through which people, ideas, goods, and services are exchanged between countries at increasing rates. Globalization serves to increase communication and interdependence among countries throughout the world.
- **Aloha+ Challenge:** Refers to the state of Hawaii's framework for implementing the SDGs at the state level. Each of the six Aloha+ Challenge goals - Clean Energy, Local Food, Natural Resource Management, Waste Reduction, Smart Sustainable Communities, and Green Workforce and Education - correspond with multiple SDGs.
- **Voluntary Local Review:** The process through which local governments and communities review and share their respective progress toward the Sustainable Development Goals. While cities such as New York and Los Angeles have engaged in voluntary local review in the past, Hawaii became the first state to do so in October 2020.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- In your own life, which of the 17 SDGs or 6 Aloha+ Challenge goals do you think is the most important to achieve in the near future, and why? Which will be the most challenging for Hawaii to achieve?
- Do you think the SDGs, as well as the Aloha+ Challenge goals, do a good job of covering all major problems countries/Hawaii face? If you could add a goal, what would it be and why?
- Quality Education (SDG 4) has been affected by the global pandemic. Assess how your school and community is/was balancing the need to educate children and young people with health and safety (SDG 3). What went well and what could have been done differently?
- How does the Aloha+ Challenge help to foster relationships between local businesses, civil society, and the local/state government? How do you think it could strengthen these ties, particularly with regard to including civil society and students such as yourself in the Aloha+ initiatives?
- How might have Covid-19 exposed weaknesses in the sustainability of Hawaii's economy, particularly with regard to the tourism industry?
 - Considering Hawaii's economy has largely been reliant on tourism in past years, what steps do you think local businesses as well as the government can take to either encourage the re-growth of tourism in a safe manner and/or diversify the economy?

IDEAS FOR ACTION

Easier

- Explore the UN's [The Lazy Person's Guide to Saving the World](#). Commit to adopting at least one action from each level into your daily life.
- Explore the interactive world map from the [Sustainable Development Report 2020](#). By clicking the dropdown menu in the left corner of the page, viewers can see global progress on each of the SDG goals. Viewers can also click on an individual country to see its profile and a more in-depth explanation of its progress toward the SDGs. Choose a specific SDG to explore on the interactive map, and share any global or regional trends you find with your class. Which country has made the most progress with your SDG, and why might this be?

- Choose the SDG most interesting to you and create a graphic or poster in a similar style to the [2020 SDG infographics](#). In your project, focus specifically on Hawaii's relationship to the SDG of your choice. Present your final work to your classmates.
 - The [Executive Summary Aloha+ Challenge 2020](#) report may be a helpful resource, especially pages 16 to 18.

- Policy Advocacy: Write to your representatives asking them to renew their commitment to advancing the SDGs in the next legislative session. In your letter, you may consider including specific policies or recommendations that align with the SDGs.

Check back in with your team on a regular basis to see everyone's progress!
